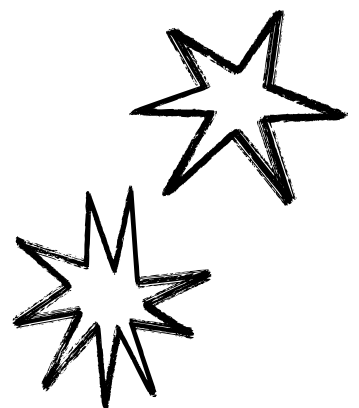


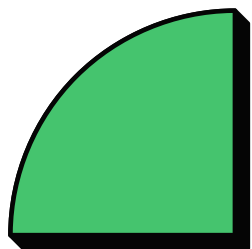

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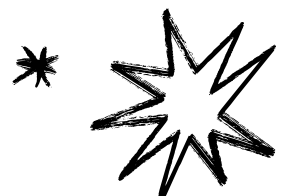




Preparing for the Next Chapter

Uni, TAFE, work, apprenticeships, gap years – there are heaps of options out there. The key is to find what suits you best. This section helps you explore different pathways, understand your choices, and make decisions that feel right for you.

Deciding what's right for you:
It's ok if you're not sure about what's next or if something has impacted your original plans. Ask for help from a trusted adult or your school or visit these websites to help you work out a plan.



It is common for us to know what we like to learn about or do, but not necessarily what occupations are related to our interest areas – check out the myfuture bullseyes. They sort occupations by subjects or interest areas, and this is a great starting point for you if you know what subjects you liked in school.

Further Study



How do I decide what to study and where?

1. Deciding what you want to do:

Make sure you check out the qualifications you are interested in and look at the units that make them up. This will help you decide if the qualification is right for you.

The [Good Universities Guide](#) is like a search engine for university degrees and qualifications. You can search by course, location, experiences etc.

2. Deciding on where to study:

If you are unsure about where you want to study find out about:

- the facilities, student experiences, work experience, exchange opportunities etc for each to help inform your decision.
- Where you will live
- How you will fund your study
- Will you be able to get the support you need?

This can help inform your decision.



3. Applying to Universities

Not all universities or qualifications require an ATAR. There are other ways to get to where you want to go. UTAS also has options to do some further study, such as [bridging courses](#) and [Associate Degrees at University College](#) if you didn't get an ATAR or apply for a School Recommendation Program.

In Tasmania the University of Tasmania (UTAS) accepts applications directly via their website. <https://www.utas.edu.au/study/apply>

Going to a Mainland University:

Applying for university in other states needs to be done through the relevant Tertiary admissions Centre (TAC) in each state. You can choose multiple course from several universities all at once. You can also apply for scholarships and special entry schemes through the TAC's portal.



There are study options all over Australia. To find out more about what is available visit:

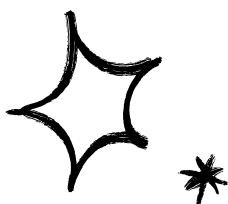
